Spring Conference & Change of Watch 9-11 March 2018

Arrive early on Friday, 9 March, and select one of the three tours available for your enjoyment, or tour on your own to explore Oak Harbor's streets lined with Garry Oaks and see adorable old town on Pioneer Street next to the water, on beautiful Oak Harbor, or head further south to historic Coupeville, Fort Casey State Park, quaint Langley, or all the way to the tip of the island at Clinton. Or head just north to the State's most often visited State Park...Deception Pass State Park and the Deception Pass bridges. We have a lot to see, and it's all wonderful!

Organized Tours:

Wineries and Distilleries of Whidbey Island: Take a mini-bus to visit 3 wineries and 1 distillery. The selected wineries produce popular wines and have received 5 stars ranking by the TripAdvisor site. The distillery is a family-owned facility that uses local berries to make liqueurs. The distillery is a recognized producer of some of the finest spirits in the world. Their Blackberry Liqueur holds a 98 rating by the Beverage Testing Institute making it the highest rated spirit of any kind produced in North America.

The cost of the tour is \$25 per person to cover the cost of transportation. Some of the wineries charge a fee for wine tasting, averaging from \$6 - \$10; however, often they apply that cost to any wine purchased. Check at each winery for their policy. The tour bus will depart the Hotel at 1300.

Minimum participation required is 25 persons.

- Penn Cove Shellfish Farm: For a tour, drive or car pool to Coupeville (south on Route 20, left at the traffic light into town, to Front Street. Turn right to the historic Warf and join others to take a boat ride on one of the farm's work boats to the floats and manufacturing vessel. The visit will be guided by a Farm staff supervisor. A maximum of 25 people can be accommodated. The boat will leave the Coupeville Wharf Dock at 1400.
- 3) <u>Shopping trip</u>: Drive North, crossing the Deception Pass bridges to Anacortes (you'll head north on Route 20, turning left where 20 makes a T). Join members of the DPSPS in a shopping spree of knitting, quilting, antique, and fashion shops.







- <u>Friday Evening</u>: Hot and Cold Hor d'oeuvres Cocktail meatballs, Battered shrimp, Mini quiche Lorraine, Caprese Bruschetta, Deli Wraps and assorted beverages.


