

I recently had the pleasure of accompanying two brothers on a long-awaited trip to Yellowstone National Park. There were five boys in my family and one sister. My sister wasn't the baby, but if you asked any boys, they would tell you she was the Princess. We all looked after her, and no brother would pick on her because he would have to endure the wrath of the other four! We'll call my sister

for clarity #5; I was #2, although, through the years, I felt that being number two wasn't always the best position. I digress; the trip consisted of myself (#2) and brothers #3 & #4. My brother #4 has been to Yellowstone many times, whereas My #3 and I have never been there. The trip started from my house with my #3 brother joining me here from his house in Olympia, and so we set out on the first leg of our adventure, a five-hour drive to Spokane, WA. We spent the night with my sister-in-law and nephew at my #4 brothers' home. With a fresh new morning and the sun shining, we were on our way to the big skies of Montana and West Yellowstone.

My # 4 brother lives close to I 90, so it was a no-brainer to get off to a good start. Mostly uneventful driving, our tour guide riding in the back seat of the pick-up, giving us details of what to expect in Yellowstone, like a possible Moose-Jam, Bear-Jam, or the ever so popular Bison-Jam. These terms are certainly foreign to the novice visitor to the park, and my #3 brother and I would soon know the meaning of such things. My fuel tank is large at 50 gallons, and it would supposedly take us about 800 miles; according to the onboard computer, we still had to make a few stops for three guys over the age of 70; there are the inevitable "station breaks," and a good restaurant doesn't hurt anything either. We made it; we lost track of time; before we knew it here, we were in West Yellowstone and headed for the Three Bears Hotel. The first night, the weather was cold, in the low 30s, and snow was predicted overnight. Morning brought us very light snow, with what looked like a nice sightseeing day ahead. One of the things about the park is you can't be in a big hurry because the speed limits are considerably slower than Montana's posted freeway speeds of 80 for cars and 70 for trucks. You soon find out why the speed is slower, Because of all the signs that say Caution animals Crossing roadways! They really mean it because it wasn't long before we caught sight of a group of Bison grazing next to the roadway. Of course, people were stopped to take pictures despite the Many signs that say, "No Parking on Roadside." Oh yes, we found out the meaning of a Bison Jam in no time; they always tell you not to take pictures with wild animals and very fast on their feet, especially when they are with Calves. I took that to heart and knew I wouldn't take selfies with these giant beasts. They may be fast animals when they have to, but when crossing the road, Bison are as slow as molasses in January. Thus, the term Bison Jam or whatever variety of animal it may be.



EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT



Opring is in the air along with a touch of pollen and for me it is time to get the boat ready for the summer boating season. My boat, being raw water cooled, needs winter preparation with the water drained from the power train before the air temperature drops to freezing. I have used a marine service company that instead of draining the water for the winter months instead runs the engine/outdrive in antifreeze for 15-20 minutes then shuts in down. This ensures that all the

passages, nooks and crannies are protected from freezing. This also means that they get to do a spring tune-up and capture the antifreeze rather than me purging it into the environment, which might be illegal and costly. This process gives me some comfort that the boating season should be trouble free.

For the past 20+ years we have rented a house in the San Juan Islands for a week in late July or early August. The homes need to at least sleep 6 sometimes 8 depending on how many additional friends that have been invited. Transportation is a pickup, boat on the trailer and an SUV for the rest of the gang. Some of the houses come with a dock but they are getting more difficult to find. For the last few years, we have had to rent a slip in Friday Harbor Marina because the rented homes have been sold and are now not available for rent.

Most of the time the routine tune-ups have led to trouble-free summers. In August 2019 and again in July 2021 the 20-year-old boat decided to break down while we were in the Islands. Both times I called Friday Harbor Marine for advice. Friday Harbor Marine is a small business owned by Ludie and Gary Westby. Ludie handles most of the scheduling and office stuff. Gary is the manager/chief mechanic of the shop. Both times Gary agreed to meet me at the marina slip and take a look at the engine. Gary arrives on time at the boat, asked me to crank it up and after a few minutes to 'shut 'er down'. Diagnosis in 2019 was the water pump on the engine and in 2021 a bad thermostat were the culprits. He returns to his shop, kicks the engine number, called me with a cost estimate for the needed parts and install for my go ahead. Under \$500 both times. The parts were ordered, UPS delivered parts next day. Gary offered to go ahead if I wanted to pay overtime charges, I declined.

After installing the new parts, we would sit on the boat and chat for about 15 minutes while the engine warmed up and he pronounced that the boat was good to go. The rest of week we finished our crabbing and put the boat back on the trailer for the Saturday morning's ferry ride and trip home.


The bottom line was that our week vacation in the San Juan Islands did not play out as we had planned. It was still a success in that we avoided getting stranded somewhere in the boat, the boat is fixed, a few crabs have found their way into the cooking pot and we got to spend a great week as a family together. Attached is Gary's business card. I highly recommend the Friday Harbor Marine folks for providing timely diagnostics and excellent service and fixing my problems while on vacation. He goes out of his way to get you back on the water. If you have a boat problem in Friday Harbor, Gary Westby is the guy to call.

I do have a Piloting (Marine Navigation) class scheduled to start September 23 for 10 weeks via Zoom taught by Gary Ball. You won't ever get lost or run aground when you know marine navigation, whether for short day trips or long multi-day cruises.

Learn the essentials of safe coastal and inland navigation using basic GPS in conjunction with charts and other marine data. The *Marine Navigation* course teaches you how to use the GPS along with traditional dead reckoning techniques for planning and laying out safe routes, as well as ensuring that you are on-course while underway.

What's included?

- Charts and their interpretation
- Landmarks and navigation aids (buoys, day marks, lights, etc.)
- Plotting courses and determining direction and distance
- The mariner's compass and converting between True and Magnetic
- Use of GPS basic GPS displays and information they provide, setting up waypoints and routes, staying on a GPS course
- Pre-planning courses and entering them into the GPS
- Monitoring progress and determining position by both GPS and traditional techniques such as bearings and dead reckoning
